<p>1. <b>Interdisciplinary International Conferences:</b> In order to expose the faculty of all the disciplines to the recent developments in their fields, a series of international conferences is proposed by the IQAC. Accordingly in collaboration with International Multidisciplinary Research Foundation (IMRF) five international conferences are held: (i) 'Innovations in Physics, Electronics Chemistry' by the Departments of Physics, Chemistry and Electronics, (ii) 'Global History, Governance and Trends in Economics and Commerce' by the Departments of Economics, History, Political Science, Commerce and Business Administration, (iii) 'Advances in Visual Communication, Library Sciences Translation Studies in World Literature' by the Departments of English, Telugu, Visual Communication and Library Science, (iv) 'Advances and Applications in Mathematics, Statistics and Computer Science' by the Departments of Mathematics, Statistics and Computer Science, and (v) 'Recent Trends in Botany, Zoology, Microbiology, Biotechnology' by the Department of Life Sciences. The IQAC proposed, coordinated and monitored these five interdisciplinary international conferences by various departments.</p>

Feedback Obtained
<p>Andhra Loyola College (Autonomous) has been focusing on maintaining quality on academic and administrative services. The IQAC initiates the system of feedback from different stakeholders' viz., students, parents, industrialists, academicians etc. The feedback was obtained on different significant aspects like, the outcomes of the programmes, updation of syllabus, quality of teachers, facilities available in the College, and various practices. During this academic year on different occasions collected feedback from alumni. 90 percent of the participants responded positively quoting that the Programmes were useful for employment and entrepreneurship, 90 percent of the respondents mentioned in their feedback that the courses were useful and the course content</p>

was appropriate and relevant. 96 percent of alumni were highly satisfied with the quality of teaching in the College. More than 90 percent of alumni responded that mentoring facilities are greatly useful. Most of the participants in feedback process are highly satisfied with the sports facilities, Examination systems in the College and other facilities IQAC collected the feedback through the placement office from the recruiters who visit the campus regularly. The placement office was successful in collecting feedback from the recruiters. 80 of the recruiting companies appreciated the facilities, opportunities and other provisions related to campus interview/placement at Andhra Loyola College Parent Teacher meeting was conducted on first Saturday of September 2019 and February 2020 and feedback was collected from parents. Respondents were highly appreciative on various aspects of the college and responded very positively that their overall impression of the college was excellent. It has been a tradition of Andhra Loyola College to collect feedback from the outgoing students on various aspects on the academic and administrative activities in order to perform a quality check and to maintain the quality and more than 80 percent of them responded good to excellent IQAC collected feedback from the College faculty and outside subject experts on curriculum related aspects. More than 80 of the faculty members have expressed that the course content was relevant and also the freedom for opportunity for curriculum management is excellent. Many of them suggested to consider the introduction of new courses. The feedback reports of all stakeholders, shared to the HODs .Coordinators/Officials meeting and also with the departments for further appropriate actions and decisions making.

### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

As Loyola College has heterogenous groups and students from various states and backgrounds, it is essential to cater to their personal and professional development. The main aim of mentoring is to encourage the students to develop new skills, improve natural talents, reach aims and realize hidden talent. With the motive of accelerating the learning process of the students, the college has developed and implemented a mentoring programme that rightly suits to the modern learners. To address the social, economic, health and academic issues of the students, mentoring gives ample chances to explore the unaddressed and unidentified issues. As students they are exposed to social networks, emotional stress, and they need counselling to come out of the disastrous situation. Apart from this, the students from rural backgrounds and deprived academic backgrounds lack self-confidence and skills to cope with the advanced technical and communication advancements. So, naturally there will be many dropouts. To help such students the IQAC has strengthened mentoring and professional counselling to the students. The college has designed a structured mentoring for all the students. For every twenty to twenty-five mentees, one mentor is allotted to address their academic and non-academic problems. Generally, four or five meetings are scheduled for an academic year, but sometimes depending upon the necessity, the number may vary. Apart from the scheduled meetings, the mentee always has a chance to meet the mentor if he/she has any important matter to discuss. The students from the underprivileged families are awarded scholarships, and a part of the tuition fees is waived off depending upon their family circumstances, as recommended by their mentors. A handbook is designed to record their personal, health, social, economic and academic details. The students can also mention other problems associated with drinking water, sanitation or other facilities. The report of the mentors is received and consolidated by the counselling centre and sent to the management for follow up. The mentors have a comprehensive view of the students' marks, the reasons for their less scores and can appoint peer group members to assist them. The mentor talks to the teachers concerned and see that the students who need help can be given extra care or allotted some work as per the

convenience of the subject teacher. The students are also recommended for remedial coaching. Coming to the high achievers, the mentors identify their strengths and suggest them to concentrate on competitive examinations, learning technical courses, teaching to students of Government Schools, reviewing articles or reading magazines to hone their communication skills. The management of Andhra Loyola College is best known for its philanthropic activities. During the time of lockdown, they took necessary steps to conduct mentoring using online mode and enquired the wellbeing of the family of the ward.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The three libraries have 73562 text books, 18390 Reference, 168 Journals, 10584 e-Journals, 24 Digital Database, 2558 CDs and DVDs. Apart from these, a special collection of Palm leaves (5 in number), CD's of National Geographic 110 Years' collection, CD's of Census, data of all Districts with Mandal-level data, Books on Paintings, Art and World Famous Museum's collections, Atlas Collections, Oxford Special Dictionary - 02 Vol.'s, etc. are available. Domain-specific laboratories with state-of-the-art equipment enrich learning experiences. There are 09 computer labs, 18 Sciences labs, 02 Labs for Visual Communications with Audio/Video recording facilities, 550 desktop computers and 30 laptops are available. An exclusive IT lab enables students to access digital platforms and pursue online courses. The college has hardware resources and licensed and open software such as Matlab, SPSS, Hadoop, MS SQL, SAS, MS Visual Basic for supplementing classroom learning. Human Resource Management

The Internal Quality Assessment Cell

2. Objectives of the Practice The main aim of ALANA is to acquire the knowledge required to educate, enlighten and empower the students through peer group interaction. Learning by doing, the students of Municipal Corporation High School- Zilla Parishad High School, Patamata, T.M.R.C Municipal High School, Bishop Azariah Girls High School, and G.D.E.T Municipal High School, CVRG Municipal Corporation High School students from 8th to 9th Classes visited the Labs under the Open Lab-Open House programme. The students were given the opportunity to experience joyful learning through experimentation. The members of the Physics Department sensitized the creative minds on science experiments. It also has a Feeding Programme called Manna, through which it takes care of the destitute, migrant labourers and pavement dwellers. The Context One of the goals of the college is to serve the poorest of the poor and provide a lending hand to the needy people in the society. Every individual is precious. To support, safeguard the needy people the management shouldered the responsibility of providing the basic amenities since 2012-2013. The students are the capacity builders who go around and identify the downtrodden people and fill their appetite. They not only gain knowledge but only learn the society through service where a good citizen is shaped. Vijayawada is the hub of migrant workers who come from various parts of the country for their survival. No money, No food - when the migrant workers suffered a lot during the pandemic period the management supported them with the basic requirements along with medicines and clothes. Practice Through ALANA programme students imbibe soft skills which are needed for them to face the challenges and risk in life. Learn the society, Acquire the skills, Facilitate the needy, Visualize the future. When they visit schools, they develop their intellectual abilities to answer the queries, observe the inquisitive minds and learn to express themselves well in a non stereotypical manner. Extending the helping hand to the needy during the time of difficulties like distributing mosquito coils or blankets, in the winter season cherish the students in giving and sharing things. The students experience a real learning and become a responsible citizen. They also develop empathy and sympathy towards the destitute and deprived people. Evidence of Success: To foster scientific temper and empower real learning, more emphasis was laid on practical learning. The following programmes were organized ? The Municipal Corporation High School and Care and Share Municipal Corporation High School students from 7th to 9th standards attended the programme OPEN LAB-OPEN HOUSE organized by ALANA in association with the Department of Physics in the month of December 2019. Along with the students, the teachers also participated in the programme, exploring experiments ? Under the programme of ALANA-MANNA, a philanthropic activity, the poor and the destitute received food. Old clothes, blankets and mosquito coils were distributed to the migrant workers and footpath dwellers. ? Clothes were distributed to Rag Pickers at Penamaluru, Poranki and Tadepalli rural areas and Christmas box were distributed on the eve of Semi-Christmas ? Packed food materials, medicines and other essentials were distributed to the people on roadsides during Pandemic.

Many organisations lend their help and support to them especially the NGOs like Help the Blind Foundation, Hong Kong, Enable



India-Bangalore, Department of Disabled Welfare and Senior Citizens, Government of Andhra Pradesh and AP State Skill Development Corporation [APSSDC]. The students inner self is sharpened and they become mentally, emotionally strong enough to work in par with others in the society. Also the poor students are financially supported through scholarship. The Context The main objective behind the programme is to hone the skills of the differently able students to lead a happy and healthy life in the society. Regular interaction with the students to find out their needs and aspirations, mould them towards the success path in life. The moral support to the students strengthens their inner self and courageous enough to face the challenges and issues they encounter in their personal as well as professional life. It enables them to explore a new world beyond their narrow confines and improve their ability. 3. The Practice A person's strength is not in his outward appearance, but in his inert abilities.

HEPSN always tries to develop the skills through empowerment. HEPSN has volunteers who act as scribes and also train the students in computers and make them work in an organised manner without being dependent on anyone. The compassionate volunteers help the disabled students and become sensitized on the hardships and learn to overcome them. The coordinators of HEPSN attend many training programmes and learn about the opportunities available for the disabled students and direct them towards the right destination. Resource rooms, access ramps, movement free corridors, lift facility, washrooms are available for students and also wheel chairs are provided for the needy. 4.

The motive is to make the vulnerable group self-governing and self-regulating. To make them think out of the box with more innovative ideas that would fetch them more income with less investment from the resources available in their locality. India is an agricultural country but due to the lack of proper assistance and support people happen to move from villages to cities in search of jobs. The drift that has been ceased, hence the farmers, artisans, farm labourers need to be sensitized on the importance of natural resource and convince that there are ample opportunities for generating income through evidences. Two days Training programme was conducted for SHG Members at Atchyyavaripalem, Pedana Mandal from 10.09.2019 to 12.09.2019 by Syamala Gold Covering Works, Machilipatanam and SHG Members started a small Imitation unit at the corner of their Village by hiring a House and Cattle Shed with 10 members on November 25th 2019. Around 30 members were working on Shift bases and per head they were able to earn Rs. 5,000/- per week.
